Summer Safety

Outdoor Fires

Are permitted within the city and must be contained in a non-combustible structure that meets fire regulations such as cement, brick or metal of at least 18 gauge and covered with a heavy gauge metal screen (opening no larger than 13mm). The fire box shall not exceed 0.61 cubic meters.

Only seasoned wood and charcoal are acceptable for outdoor fires. You cannot burn items such as rubbish, garden refuse or plastic in the city.

Remember to consider the weather conditions when starting an outdoor fire, be respectful of your neighbours and always remember to never leave a fire unattended!

Barbecues

Are to be used in a reasonable and safe manner, which includes keeping the unit a safe distance from all combustible materials when lit. A lit barbecue should not be left unattended.

Check your barbecue regularly to ensure it is in good operating condition and never use a barbecue indoors.

Fireworks

Are permitted on private property: from dusk to 11:00 p.m. on **Victoria Day, Canada Day and Labour Day**. If you are under 18, don't use fireworks without adult supervision.

Pet Adoption

Are you thinking of adding a dog or cat to your family?

Owning a pet is an important commitment, and here are some questions you need to consider before you make the decision:

Can you have a pet where you live? Many rental properties don't allow pets, or have restrictions on the type or size of pet you can own so it's important to check with your landlord before adopting.

Are you financially prepared? The cost of owning a pet involves more than just the initial adoption fee. Make sure you know the costs of food, toys, grooming and supplies, boarding, routine vaccinations & veterinary care, and unexpected veterinary emergencies.

Do you have the time for a pet? Puppies and kittens require a lot of care and training especially in their first year. Adult pets require daily exercise and attention in order to be happy and well balanced. Lack of time is one of the main reasons that pets are relinquished to animal shelters and rescues every year.

Do you know who will care for your pet while you go on vacation? You will need to arrange to have family or friends that will commit to caring for your pet, or pay for a boarding facility, or pet

sitter while you are away.

Do you have young children? Children and toddlers need to be supervised around pets at all times to ensure both the safety of your pet and your children.

Do you, or anybody in your family, suffer from allergies? Consider fostering a dog or cat from a local rescue organization, or offer to pet-sit in your home for family or friends while they're away to check tolerance for animals.

Do you want a puppy or kitten, or would you consider adopting an older animal? There are many adult animals in shelters and rescues looking for homes. Older animals are commonly overlooked and the last to be adopted at shelters, but with an older animal, what you see is what you get. There is no guessing as to what size they will be, or what personality they will grow into.

Do you want a purebred or mixed breed animal? Both make wonderful companions. If you have a specific breed in mind, make sure you do your research to find out what health and genetic problems they are prone to.

Are you planning on adopting from an animal shelter or rescue organization, or buying from a breeder? Do not consider purchasing a puppy or kitten from a pet store, unless they are from a satellite location for a rescue

organization. Dogs and cats sold in pet stores are often from puppy mills, and/or irresponsible breeders, so purchasing these animals because you feel sorry for them is just perpetuating the problem.

Are you planning on adopting from a breeder? Make sure you have done your research to ensure you are choosing a reputable breeder. The popularity of websites, like Kijiji, has allowed irresponsible breeders to flourish.

Responsible breeders:

- * Put a lot of time and money into producing healthy and sound puppies or kittens, and will provide a health guarantee on your new pet.
- * Provide routine veterinary care, and do health screening and testing on their breeding animals in order to avoid passing on heritable disorders to future generations.
- * Will be interested in your lifestyle and experience, and will want to ensure that they find the best match for the pet. They will have a questionnaire for you to fill out before they will consider selling you an animal.
- * Will take back an animal at any point in their life if the purchaser no longer wants it, or can no longer care for it.
- * Does not sell their animals to pet stores.

* Can provide references for families who have purchased their animals.

Warning signs of an irresponsible breeder:

- * They may breed multiple different breeds and mixes of these breeds.
- * They will not allow you to see their breeding facilities, or allow you to meet the parents of the animal.
- * Their animals can appear dirty and unhealthy and/or unsocialized.
- * Their animals are kept in cages and are not provided with regular exercise and time outside the cages.
- * They insist on meeting you offsite (ie. in a store parking lot) to purchase your new pet.
- * The animals they sell have not had a veterinary exam and first vaccines.

When you are truly prepared to adopt a pet, it is an incredibly rewarding experience. Pets are amazing loving companions that can add joy and love to your life, and make a family feel complete.



Interesting Facts About Saskatchewan...

1. In 1960, Saskatoon businessman and art collector Fred Mendel approached Mayor Sidney L. Buckwold to initiate discussions for the creation of a new civic art gallery which would provide a permanent home for the Saskatoon Art Centre. Subsequently, Mendel donated \$175,000 to build such a gallery, and the amount was matched by the provincial government and augmented by assistance from the municipal government.
2. The staging of the first Grey Cup in Toronto in 1909 evidently inspired the organization of a men's amateur rugby league in 1910; but of the five original cities who were to take part, only Moose Jaw and Regina fielded teams. Moose Jaw swept the four games, but the Regina Rugby Club would win 21 of 22 provincial championships between 1911 and 1935.
3. Competitive swimming was slow to evolve in Saskatchewan. Swimming was confined to natural bodies of water until pools were built in Regina in 1909, Moose Jaw in 1910, and Saskatoon in 1913. The province's first accomplished swimmers were those of the University of Saskatchewan team of the 1920s and 1930s. Phyllis Dewar of Moose Jaw achieved national renown in 1934 when she won four gold medals at the British Empire Games in London, England.
4. On January 1, 1917 a new era of law enforcement began in Saskatchewan, when the Saskatchewan Provincial Police (SPP) took over day-to-day policing duties from the Royal North-West Mounted Police (RNWMP). The lifespan of the force, however, was short. In 1928 the government of Saskatchewan replaced the SPP with the RCMP, with some SPP members joining (or rejoining) the Mounted Police, usually keeping the same rank. The demise of the SPP was not incompetence but cost. The Saskatchewan government, even before the arrival of the Great Depression, was increasingly worried about expenditures, and in the case of policing the math was simple: having its own police force cost \$500,000 a year; while the RCMP could do the same job for \$200,000. In following this path the Saskatchewan government began a trend that in 1932 would see several other provinces accept the RCMP as their provincial police force out of financial necessity.
5. Great distances, low population densities, and economic cycles shaped the structure of commercial aviation in Saskatchewan. Barnstormers and flight training operations formed the early beginnings of aviation in the 1920s. A decade later, bush pilots established small operations at remote bases, transporting prospectors, trappers and goods to isolated regions. Commercial aviation began in full force when companies established whole plane charter operations that provided the revenue base to finance expansion into unit toll passenger scheduled routes. In 1932 a group of northern aviators established M & C Aviation, based in Prince Albert. In the southern tier Prairie Airways, established in 1938, transported passengers and mail between Regina, Moose Jaw, and Saskatoon. In a further development, the Saskatchewan government purchased M & C Aviation in 1947 to form the Crown corporation Saskatchewan Government Airways (Saskair).
