Fall Home Maintenance

A few home maintenance points to consider as fall draws near:

Inspect the Roof

With all the wind we get its good to check and make sure there are not missing or damaged shingles. Repairing any issues now will help prevent damage to your roof from the hash winter elements.

Clean the Gutters

After the leaves have fallen flush out the gutters and make sure to check your downspouts and that water is flowing away from your foundation, Clogged gutters are a major cause of ice dams. Using leaf guards helps keep debris out of the gutters.

Check Windows & Doors

Check the caulking around windows and doors and reseal as needed to keep heat from escaping the building envelope. Now is also a good time to clean your windows before winter sets in!

Get the Fireplace Ready

Make sure the fireplace is cleaned and maintained/inspected by professional if needed. Check the chimney to make sure there are no obstructions and inspect for any cracks or damage that needs to be repaired.

Clean Ducts

If you haven't had your ducts cleaned it might be worth cleaning them yourself or having a professional do it before winter.

Deck Clean up & Repair

Put away or cover deck furniture to protect it during winter. Clean and repair the deck as needed. Clean the BBQ and cover it. You can still BBQ through the winter but cleaning it now is easier than in the winter.

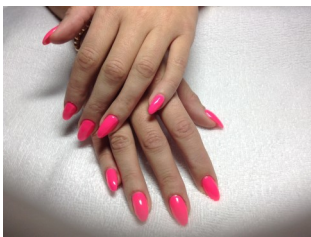

Newborns and Pets

Bringing Home Baby

Congratulations - You're expecting a baby! This is an exciting time for everyone, and you will have to help your pet adjust to the new family member and furnishings.

General tips to keep in mind:

Before the baby arrives:

Expose your pet to baby gear such as strollers, swings, and noisy toys; start walking your dog with the stroller before the baby is born.

Play recordings of baby sounds to desensitize your pet; start at a low volume and use positive reinforcement such as treats and play while the sounds are playing. Gradually increase the volume until you reach a real-life volume

Don't allow your pet to share a bed with your infant; get them used to sleeping away from the bed or nursery before the baby arrives. Access can be blocked by using baby gates, doors, a screen door on the nursery, and crib nets. Another method is to confine your pet to a different bedroom to sleep, or for dogs, get them used to a crate.

Address any undesirable behavior such as jumping up or food aggression; take your dog to obedience classes. Teaching dogs basic commands will help encourage calm controlled behavior.

Use a swaddled doll to get your pet used to you carrying the baby around, or having the baby on your lap all the time.

Encourage friends and family with infants to visit your home to begin accustoming your pets to babies .

For cats, prepare comfortable areas to enrich their indoor environment such as cat trees, suspended shelving, and window seats. If you want to make adjustments to litter box locations, and food/water dish locations, do so long before so your cat is not overwhelmed with changes.

Homecoming:

When you return from the hospital, have someone else take your baby into another room so your pet has a chance to greet you. After the initial greeting, allow your pet to sit calmly beside you while you hold the baby. Keep dogs on leashes so they can be more easily controlled – they can be allowed to drag the leashes. Allow your pet to politely sniff the baby, but any rambunctious or focused behavior should be immediately discouraged.

NEVER leave your pet alone unsupervised with a baby or small child; pets should also be provided with comfortable resting areas that allow them to get away.

For pets that have multiple behavior problems such as aggression, fear, or separation anxiety prior to bringing home a new baby, it can be difficult to balance what is necessary to keep everyone happy and safe. Please speak to your veterinarian to help identify problems and find appropriate solutions.

Rosewood Updates

Rosewood Elementary Schools

It's exciting to see the ongoing construction at the school site. A lot of work is going on at the school. Take a drive by if you haven't lately or check out the webcam to see the progress on the outside. Construction still seems to be on track for completion in September 2017.

Road Construction

Boychuk Drive / Highway 16 Interchange

The three (3) Teams shortlisted for this work received the Request for Proposals (RFP) in June 2016 and are well underway with completing their proposal for the City. Once the City receives, reviews and evaluates these proposals, the work will be awarded to the successful consultant/contractor team and work will get underway. At this time construction is set to begin in Spring of 2017 with an estimated completion in Fall 2018.

The current design of the interchange includes pedestrian and cyclist paths/walkways. There are also plans for attenuations walls to minimize traffic noise in adjacent neighbours. What exactly that will be is unknown at this time.

We can expect there to be detours and road closures during the course of the project.

The Meadows Market in Rosewood

The Meadows Market is a parcel of land east of Zimmerman Road that was added to Rosewood in 2014. This employment area will consist of retail, commercial and light industrial land uses.

Costco is an anchor store for this market. Construction is progressing on the building and was set to open late this summer. It looks like it will be opening this year. Road construction is still underway and should be completed this fall.

Parks

Hyde Park Naturalized Area Weir Repairs

Hyde Park weir repairs were completed in July 2016.

The weir is used to maintain consistent water levels in the wetland. This helps to promote robust wildlife habitat in the wetlands. It will take some time for the effect of the repaired weir to be noticeable. The water levels in the wetland should increase over time.

Glen H. Penner Park

No new updates on the park this summer. Many design components have been noted on the concept plan such as; softball field, soccer field, toboggan hill, rink, play area, future water feature. Keep in mind this a concept plan and is subject to change.

The City previously advised that park construction was tentatively scheduled to begin sometime in 2016. Portions may be completed by the time the schools are open late in 2017, however this is subject to change.

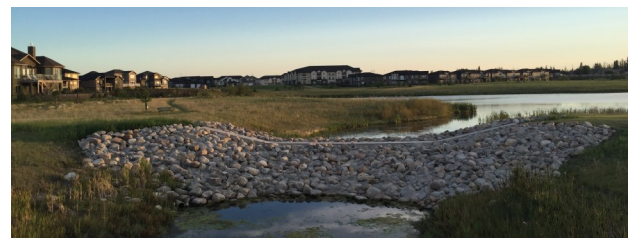

During the Municipal and School Board Election, Saskatoon voters have an opportunity to elect a mayor, councillors and separate and public school board trustees. - * A Canadian Citizen;
- * At least 18 years old;
- * A resident of the City of Saskatoon for at least three consecutive months immediately preceding the day of election; and
- * A resident of the Province of Saskatchewan for at least six consecutive months immediately preceding the day of the election.

Interesting Facts About Saskatchewan...

- Sports and Recreation in Saskatchewan:** Sports and recreation were simple in Saskatchewan's early years: transportation limited individuals to participating on local teams and clubs, with few inter-community competitions. Much of the settlers' recreation and leisure activities originated in the home: hospitality was a main concern, and visits were encouraged among neighbours. At these spontaneous and prearranged visits, baseball games and dances often occurred. When schools were built, they became the home for recreational activities. Annual picnics held at the schools were the biggest event at that time, and sports days—where baseball, wrestling, horseshoes, horse racing, soccer, boxing and foot races occurred—became a staple later in the period. The Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) and Young Women's Christian Association's (YWCA) played important roles in providing recreational and sporting activities for citizens. The first YMCAs came into existence in Moose Jaw (1905), Regina (1907) and Saskatoon (1913), while the first YWCAs formed in Moose Jaw (1907), Regina (1910) and Saskatoon (1911).
- The First Saskatchewan Flag:** Created in 1964 for the province's diamond jubilee in 1965 and the Canadian centennial in 1967, and designed by Sister Imelda of St. Angela's Convent in Prelate, was divided into two equal horizontal bands of red and green, and displayed a stem of wheat and the province's shield of arms. A design by Anthony Drake of Hodgeville was selected by a legislative committee and proclaimed the official provincial flag on September 23, 1969. Divided into two equal horizontal bands of green and yellow, it featured the western red lily and the shield of arms.
- Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association:** At the turn of the 20th century, the local city, town and village governments of the day believed it was necessary to have an organization through which they could, on a collective basis, express to the provincial government their needs and desires for legislative and financial services. In 1906 the Union of Saskatchewan Municipalities was formed, under the leadership of Regina mayor Peter McAra Jr. The name would later change to the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association (SUMA). Delegates to the founding convention identified the reason why working collectively would benefit individual municipalities. They felt individual municipalities were too small to lobby the provincial government alone. They also recognized that different municipalities wanted different things and would present a multiplicity of requests to the government, thereby effectively paralyzing the province. The inaugural convention boldly stated: "Municipal organization will be the mouthpiece of the province."

Today SUMA represents 13 cities, 145 towns, 252 villages, 31 resort villages, and 33 northern municipalities. SUMA remains the provincial voice of urban municipal governments; through strength in unity it advocates, negotiates and initiates improvements in local provincial and federal legislation, as well as providing programs and services to enhance urban life in Saskatchewan.

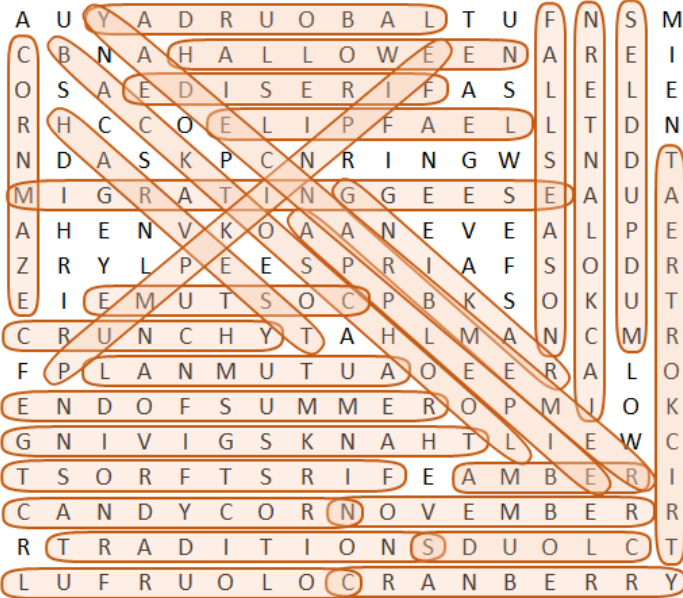

Fall Gardening & Lawn Care

Lawn Care

Make sure you use fall fertilizer on your lawn to encourage roots and help green up your lawn earlier in the spring. Do one final mow low cut (but not too low) late in the summer .

Cleaning up Leaves/Mulching

Bagging leaves is one option but also consider mowing them to break the leaves into small pieces and leave them on the lawn. They will decompose throughout the winter. Make sure to mow when they are dry and no more than about six inches of leaves per season. Excess can be used as mulch in your flowerbeds and vegetable garden, or add to your compost bin.



Tree and Shrub Planting

Contrary to what some may think, fall is a good time for planting right up until the end of September or early October depending on weather. Talk to your garden centre about what you can plant in the fall.

Fall Pruning

Late fall is an excellent time to prune trees and shrubs when they become dormant. Talk to your garden centre about proper pruning techniques and timing.

Flower Garden

Cut back your perennial flowers during the fall. A little bit of effort in the fall will provide healthier flower beds for your garden. If you can unsure how much to cut back or when depending on the flower talk to your garden centre and you can also check online. Not all flowers are the same so it's a good idea to check when doing it for the first time.



Fall Bulbs

There are bulbs such as tulips that should be planted in the fall so they will be the first to bloom in the spring. Check with your favorite garden centre to see what bulbs you can plant.



There are some native plants that might interest you in planting such as the prairie crocus. It's always a beautiful sight to see flowers bloom even when there's snow on the ground!

Outdoor Watering System/Faucets

Remove all garden hoses, drain and store in your garage or shed. Standing water can freeze irrigation system outdoor water spigots. Make sure to turn off and drain to avoid freezing & pipe breakage.

Clean Yard Equipment

Clean all of your lawn care equipment including draining and properly disposing fuel for gas operated equipment. Take out your snowblower and other winter equipment to make sure they are functioning. It might even be a good time to clean out the garage to get a jump on spring cleaning.

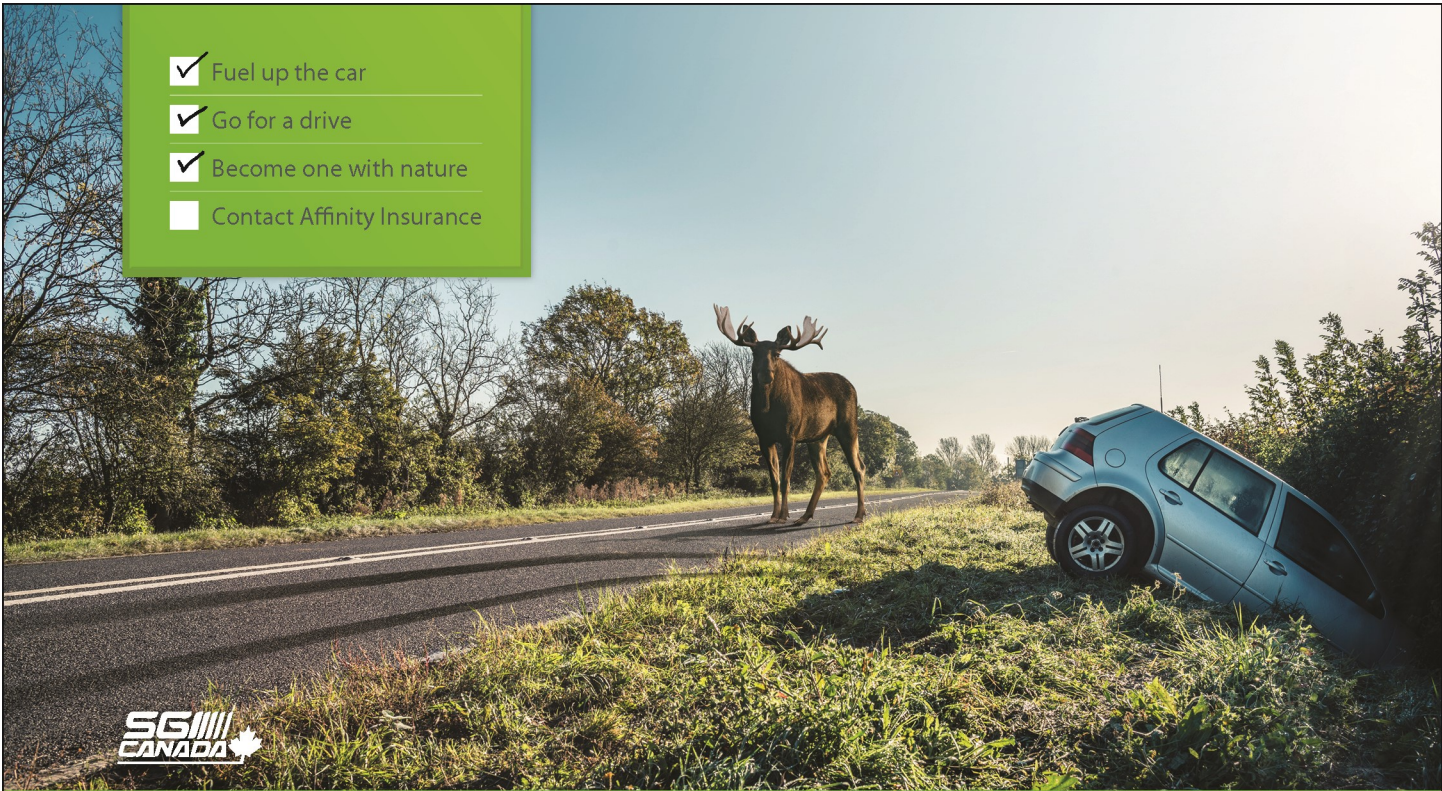
